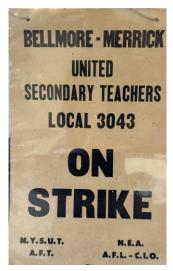

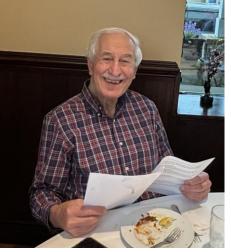

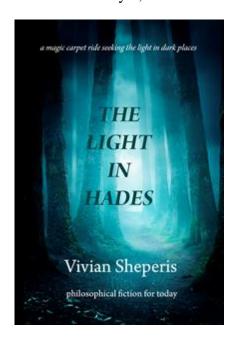
Heard Here and There

VOTE -- School budget votes Nassau County will take place on Tuesday, May 21. Vote to keep public education strong.

POLITICAL ACTION NEWS – The New York State budget was recently passed. Of particular interest to us was the rejection of the plan to eliminate reimbursement for the Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amounts (IRMAA) for "higher" income state retirees. Retroactively discontinued, the IRMAA Medicare Part B reimbursement would cost affected retirees anywhere from \$694 to \$4,164 annually. The success that NYSUT had in fighting this is proof of the importance of VOTE/COPE contributions. Lobbying legislators is a critical function of union political action supported by VOTE/COPE money.

BMRTA won the Abel Blattman Award for VOTE/COPE contributions. Well done! Let's keep it up for next year.

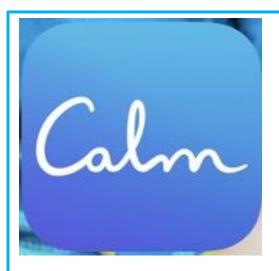
